Two hundred forty-one delegates from 61 congregations gathered in Berne, IN at the First Mennonite Church for the 43rd ACA March 9th and 10th with a total of 310 people in attendance. Art and Mary Newcomer, Jim Burkett, Ed Lehman, and Pastors Rick and Dave went to represent Bethel. Ohio Conference has much to offer its congregations and uses the annual gathering to inform the delegates of what to share back home.

The weekend consisted of business sessions, workshops, displays, and worship services. A breakfast for Mennonite Men and Women was also available to attend. All of these opportunities plus gathering with old and new friends equals a good time had by all.

It's encouraging to fellowship with the greater Mennonite church family. Mary Newcomer, a delegate veteran, says, “I enjoy meeting with people from other Mennonite Churches. The Mennonite Church is diverse and some ‘do church’ differently than we do. We can learn from each other and appreciate the different gifts we bring to the church and to our worship services.”

We can appreciate our differences as well as

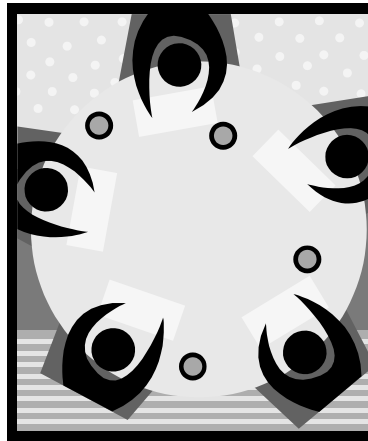

Bethel Youth take on the Challenge of Science Olympiad

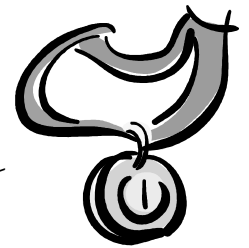

The way our main coach describes Science Olympiad is where you go and you spend a day taking several college level tests and whoever does the best gets medals or ribbons. For Science Olympiad, I am signed up for the following events: Optics, which is about light, lenses, and mirrors; Keep the Heat, a test on thermodynamics (the study of heat); Road Scholar, which is working with road maps and topographical maps; Write It Do It, an event where you have 2 people, a writer and a doer, the writer writes about how to build a model which the doer then tries to build without seeing the model; and Towers, where you build a wooden tower before the event, and then try to see if it can hold a bucket of sand while being very light and very tall. The best towers weigh about 7-9 grams and hold a 15 kg bucket of sand without breaking. My best memory of Science Olympiad would be at the New Albany Invitational where my partner and I beat some of the best teams in the USA to get a 1st place medal in Road Scholar. We

beat the second place team by one point. In Towers, we then got a 2nd place medal. I will do Science Olympiad next year because I have been participating in it since 6th grade and really enjoy it.

Bethel Youth Becky Wilkins and Trace Robinaugh also participated in Science Olympiad. Becky and Annie were occasionally partners in Towers, and Becky also participated in Forestry. Trace Robinaugh participated in Bottle Rockets.

The Junior High team competed in the Regional Tournament March 17th and qualified for the State Tournament *April 28th!*

Family Renewal Sabbatical Plans

This summer from June 1-August 31, I will be on Sabbatical. “The essence of sabbatical is rooted in the Hebrew word sabbat and the biblical traditions surrounding it.” This of course connects to weekly Sabbath, to leaving the land fallow every seventh year, and to the year of Jubilee. “Sabbath keeping values our ability to rest and not merely our ability to work. When we keep the Sabbath, we live in God’s economy, where our purpose is not production but play. In keeping Sabbath, we measure ourselves by a different yardstick.”¹ As the son of a workaholic father, this is both a challenging and essential discipline for me.

And of course, we see the practice of Sabbath modeled in Jesus’ life. “He retreated to the wilderness for forty days after his baptism, and during the course of his ministry, he often went away to pray and to gain strength in silence and meditation on mountaintops and by lakesides.”¹ I strive to follow this model by taking my weekly Sabbath on Mondays and by taking a quarterly retreat day. Things come up that adjust this at times, but these serve as the markers of this discipline in my life. Now I am coming to an extended period of Sabbath rest.

The primary purposes of



this time are family renewal with my wife and children and to create space for an extended period of Sabbath and personal renewal. An additional piece of this sabbatical will be to have space to learn more about our congregational history.

The year 2015 will mark Bethel’s 125th birthday. With this milestone coming up, now seems like a good time to do some additional study of our congregation’s history and to give focused attention both to how we might mark this time together and to how God might be inviting us to build upon this foundation in the years to come.

My family and I are also making plans for a mixture of things to do together and space for my own personal reflection and self care. We have plans for a camping trip, attending family camp at Luz, and several day trips. We are very excited about these. Additionally I am making plans for a week at the beginning and another week at the end of the summer for extended times of silence and solitude. On Sundays when we are in the area, I plan to attend other local congregations for worship.

As we approach this time for family and personal renewal, I trust that the congregation will also benefit from space to use various gifts God has given us. We are blessed to have Pastor Rick available to assist with covering many of my responsibilities and James Lochridge will be completing his ministry internship among us this summer as well. More details about all of these arrangements will be coming as the time draws nearer.
