"Six Elements of Exponential Growth"

While I was at the Mennonite Church USA Convention in Kansas City the first week of July, I had the opportunity to sit in on some seminars led by Alan Hirsch. Hirsch has written and spoken extensively on the church and reaching out. One aspect of this is APEST (Apostle, Prophet, Evangelist, Shepherd, Teacher) which comes from Ephesians 4:11 and is a center piece of our restructure as we move forward.

APEST fits into a larger context, however, that began with a question that pestered Hirsch. "How was it that the early church grew from 25,000 Christians at 100AD to 20 million Christians by 300AD?" That is a significant growth rate especially considering the fact that they had no buildings, they were illegal, they had no clergy class, and they did not have printed Bibles for everyone.

As Hirsch looked into this further, he found similar rates of growth in China and in the early Methodist movement in the US. He compared these movements and found six common elements that were present in each of them. He also concluded that the potential for this kind of growth is always present, the DNA is always there; but it must be released. The elements he shared were...

- 1. "Jesus is Lord!" This is a simple yet powerful confession of faith. It names the rule of God in the world and that Jesus is the Lord of that rule.
- 2. Jesus gets into his people through discipleship. The process of discipleship is foundational.
- 3. Missional Incarnation. Mission means sent in Latin and mission needs to be incarnated/embodied where the people are.
- 4. APEST/ fivefold ministry taken from Ephesians 4:11. This approach to ministry incarnates the fullness of Christ in the body and empowers the whole of the body to engage in the mission.
- 5. Organic structures, that is not hierarchical in nature and more fluid in form.

6. Liminality communitos which is a combination of risk taking and group connection. As risks are taken in groups, it creates bonds among the people and with God as we rely on God to move us through the risks/challenges.

Additionally, Hirsch noted that Jesus can do more with 12 disciples than with 12,000 consumerists. As such, we need not worry about being small. Hirsch suggested that if you get the DNA right, (make the main thing the main thing) that little things grow.

Much of the growth stems from the assumption that everyone has the seed of the church with the DNA already ready in them. Every one of us has a church in us just as every seed from a tree has a tree in it. Likewise every church has a forest of churches in it just as every tree has a forest of trees in it. Jesus has given us what we need.

Much of the barrier to this type of growth is the reality that many in the American church today do not see themselves as "sent." Yet Hirsch would assert that there is no such thing as an unsent Christian. If one is a Christian, one is sent thus conversion and call are not separate as we so often make them. Rather, the conversion is the call and the baptism is the ordination. (Which we might note was true of the Mennonite tradition as well in our use of the Lot to call pastors.)

And so I wonder as we move forward in our restructuring, "How are we doing at incorporating these six elements of exponential growth?" Where are our strengths and where are our weaknesses? What adjustments need to be made? But perhaps most important of all, do we each believe that there is the DNA of a church in each one of us? Do we each embody an identity of "sentness?" And are we all committed to being fully engaged and active in the work of the kingdom that God has before us? Exponential growth is possible and Hirsch believes that these are the components of making that reality.

Free parking is available on site, and golfcarts will be used to aid elderly or handicapped accessibility.


