

Maurer Family Renewal Sabbatical By Pastor Dave Maurer

Beginning June 1st, I will be on a three month Family Renewal Sabbatical. As you know, Sabbath rest is something that God commanded in the Old Testament and that Jesus regularly practiced in his ministry. While the

call to ministry is one that is filled with joys and blessings, holy moments and deep connections; it is also one that is 24/7 rather than 9 to 5. Even during "off hours," there is often still a sense of being

This time away from the weekly responsibilities of ministry at Bethel including meetings, worship services and administration is intended to be an opportunity for personal and family renewal. It is a chance to step back, take a breath, connect with family and gain perspective. It is a chance to spend focused time in prayer and spiritual reading as well as an opportunity to look more deeply at our congrega-

tional history in preparation for our 125th year in 2015. And it will provide space to attend to my physical well being and some household projects. It is a chance to pause before plunging into another block of years of ministry together.

Given the age of our family, much of our time will be spent locally with day trips here and there. We will worship together and experience how other congregations worship. Additionally, I will spend a week in early June at the Hermit-

age in Michigan where I will have some time of silence and solitude. In July, we will take a family camping trip to Hocking Hills. And in August, I will have a week at the Abby in Gethsemane, a monastery in Kentucky where Thomas Merton

spent significant time.

While I am out of the office, Pastor Rick, James Lochridge, and many of you will be filling in, for which I am deeply grateful. James' focus will be mostly on youth ministry, VBS and worship.

While these three months will provide needed space for me and for my family, I trust that they will also provide important opportunities for Rick and James in their ministry journeys as they have opportunities to minister in different ways. Moreover, I trust that this time will also provide meaningful space for others in the congregation to follow God's calling and to use their gifts. We believe in the priesthood of all believers, yet it is all too easy to become too "pastor focused" in

our approach to ministry. While we attempt to create regular opportunities for many people to be involved in ministry at Bethel, my time away will create additional spaces.

My time of sabbatical rest will begin with a time of blessing during the worship service on June 3rd. It will conclude on August 31st with a re -commissioning to follow during the worship service on September 2nd. Until then, I invite your prayers for me and for my family. On how to be successful in college: "I think a huge mark of success is that you leave college having a better sense of who you are and where you're headed, and that you have truly LEARNED in ways that have changed you for the better---motivating you to make helpful contributions in the world and to expand your perspectives."

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Peace and Justice Matters

Our purpose statement is:

The Purpose of the Peace and Justice Lunch is to live as disciples of Christ who embody Micah 6:8 "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

We do this by...

- 1. Discerning matters that need attention,
- 2. Raising awareness about these matters, and
- 3. **Facilitating opportunities** to respond to them.

Discerning: Because there is so much suffering and injustice in the world, discerning is crucial for us. Which of the many issues do we make a priority? Recently we have chosen to make human trafficking, modern day slavery, a priority.

Raising awareness: Recently we became aware of the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center in Cincinnati and planned a trip there. Originally there were twenty Bethel people interested in going but due to schedule conflicts the list shrunk to seven: Randy Longenecker, Bob and Janice Rabenstein, Dennis and Sharon Showalter,

and Bill and Eleanor Shumaker. Our original intention was to learn more about human trafficking. We did learn more about human traf-



ficking but we also became much more aware of the suffering of 19th Century Negro Slavery. By the media of murals, a movie, historical accounts, many quotes and an electronic device we were given a tour of happenings of the history of slavery from their being brought from Africa to America by ship to Reconstruction (attempted reconstruction).

Facilitating opportunities: Although the trip turned out to be learning more about 19th Century, I now come back to the issue human trafficking. For that we will provide a list of what we can do to combat the evil of modern day slavery, human trafficking.

We invite any and all of you to join us at noon in the Bethel Fellowship Room each first and third Tuesday of every month as we discern, raise awareness, and facilitate opportunities to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with God.

Greetings supporters and friends of Adriel! I'm excited to share how the Lord has been working on our campus and how your prayers are making an impact. Thinking about Spring, I am reminded of last year at this time and how baptism became a buzzword around campus. Two separate youth approached me about getting baptized, and it surely had to have been the Spirit. Now a year later, things have come full circle. By the end of this month, we will have had NINE baptisms! What I thought might have just been a random occurrence has turned into a powerful witness for the Lord. We have a three session foundational class offered to youth interested in baptism and



provide a way for these youth to be baptized into a supporting Church family. At a youth's baptism, we invite adults and fellow youth he or she feels are an example of Christ or close to them. At the service, everyone shares words of encouragement and affirmation. From a youth's initial interest through the baptism, every step is incredible. I feel blessed to share in their spiritual journeys. In striving to provide the guidance in these matters, I am currently in the licensing process with the Mennonite Church.

Here are some of the responses in our foundational class to the question:

"How does baptism change your life?"

"You're making a commitment to God, and you have faith you're going to make a change in your life" –Brook, age 16

"If you make a commitment, God will be with you in your problems to lead you." –Angel, age 17

"I focus on the all the good in my life, and I've straightened up. [Baptism] is putting me on the right path." –Wade, age 16, after his baptism

Notes from Bethel Historian, Donna Lehman

June 15-27, 1992 (20 years ago) A group of about 27 people took a 'Tour Imagination' trip to Europe (Germany, France, Switzerland, Austria). This was basically a trip for a choral group, under the leadership of Byron Kauffman, known as the Gemeinschaft Singers (German for 'Community'). The choir numbered about 18 and others in the group were family members. After 20 years, here are what some of the travelers remember about the adventure:

Janet Wilkins- was fascinated by the well kept 'old' buildings; to this day remembers some of the German words to some of the music; singing in the beautiful cathedrals, hearing cowbells, watching birds that were somewhat different than ours and the flowers (tulips) on the mountains.

Dennis and Sharon Showalter (also Daniel and Heather)-getting lost in Strasbourg...hence the writing the song "Bye, Bye, Bus!"; chiming church bells and the Swiss cowbells; beautiful flowers in the Zollikon Church; and Bob Rabenstein, who did a re-enactment of the Georg Blaurock interrupting the Church service (you'll have to ask!).

Marla Longenecker-singing together in the Swiss and German Churches of our Mennonite 'Gemeinschaft,' and the occasional rendition of "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow" as familiarly 'Page 606.' We did this in a school for special needs children in Alsace, Lorraine, and in a majestic Cathedral in a German town.

Randy Longenecker-the sound of our singing in a cathedral and the expression of appreciation from the other tourists there; the mist and isolated sound of cowbells surrounding Traxelwald, a prison for Anabaptists; the beauty of the Austrian Alps and the City of Salzburg; communicating with our halting German with the Rothlisburger family with whom we stayed in Switzerland; the glee on young Alan Kauffman's face as he watched me sample our host's home-brewed beer!

Bob and Janice Rabenstein (also Anne)-the day that most of the group went to Salzburg, we rented a car to find the village of Rabenstein, Germany. Well, we found it, but it was only about 6-8 hours with no business except for a Bed and Breakfast. Then, we almost missed the tour bus because of rental car delays. (Anne wanted to come away with the Rabenstein Village sign, but needless to say, Bob questioned her moral standing on this, so she backed down!)

Byron Kauffman-singing in the various churches and visiting the places where the Anabaptists lived, worshiped and his from their captors.

Barb Kauffman-visiting the Cathedrals and singing to small crowds who gathered to listen.

We stopped and listened to the beautiful music. Another memory is Carl helping our tour guide Arnold find our lost bus parking place. Arnold couldn't remember where it was parked. Carl came to the rescue.
