years young and above) were honored at a Senior Celebration Tea. Little did we know that day, that it would be one of the last times our oldest member, Ruby Byler would grace our presence. On Sunday, May 19th, while en route to a Cincinnati Reds game with Paul and Sally Harshbarger, Sally's phone rang with news that Ruby wasn't doing well. Sally called the church and asked Barb Kauffman to go and stay with Ruby in her stead. Before Barb arrived at Green Hills, Sally's phone rang again, with Ruby's daughter Rosie bearing the sad news that our Ruby had passed. Family and friends gathered at her visitation on Thursday evening and memorial

service on Friday morning.

I later learned that the hospice nurse had been bathing Ruby when she breathed her last. What a significant way to leave the world...the same way that we enter it...being bathed! Of course, there were lots of interesting details that I learned about Ruby at her memorial, and as is often the case, I was left wanting another conversation with her. One day, I pray that opportunity will come. Ruby

and I were Facebook friends and she apparently was enjoying my gardening pictures this spring. I found out through Dan that we shared a love of gardening. Lee just repainted two wrought iron chairs a bright (Ruby?) red for me last week, and they sit across a grass path from each other making for a delightful shaded sitting area to enjoy the fragrant flowers and watch the birds. I wish she could have joined me there.

Her memorial service is on DVD available to check out from the library.

At the Senior Celebration Tea, Barb Landes who paired up with Ruby, shared the following, which I had planned to share in July, her birth month: **The Ruby Fisher Byler Story** This special life began on a Sunday

This special life began on a Sunday in DeGraff, Ohio to the lives of Freeman Henry Fisher and Nellie

Salome Detweiler. Mattie King was the helpful hired girl. Ruby lived on a farm and knew the chores of cows, chickens and pigs. Besides DeGraff, Ruby lived as far as Philadelphia, PA and Goshen, Indiana, but most of her life was in Logan County.

As a child, her memories were very pleasant. Her nickname was Fish. She didn't like math, being called fatty, nor being paddled by her dad. Once she and brother Dale were bored and sawed off both ends of their dad's wheelbarrow. That deserved a paddling! She loved playing games with parents and siblings even though they often fought about it.

A special influence came from Arlene Yoder and Dorcas Kauffman. Ruby felt she had a gift for cooking and therefore made her favorite meal of roasted chicken, mashed potatoes, peas and strawberry rhubarb pie. Yes, Ruby is not perfect, but did tell a lie once. She put eggs in a carton knowing one was broken but did not remove it. To this day she has guilt.

Her first kiss came from Tracy Humble. She says it was on her cheek. She enjoyed


listening to Amos & Andy, Red Skelton and Jot'em Down Store on the radio.

Why did Ruby go to Goshen College? She admired people who attended the college. Ruby could never be a lifeguard as her talents in water were limited.

Roy proposed while they sat on a couch. Her store bought wedding dress was white but the train was cut off by her mom. She was married in a church. This ends the first part of her life. Thank you Ruby, for your friendship and influence on my life. What a special influence you have had on Bethel ladies.

Senior Spotlight on Ruth Weber Yoder by Jan Smucker

One afternoon recently I had the privilege of visiting Ruth in her lovely condo at Green Hills. She related many interesting stories of her life and gave me a grand "tour" of her new location. Her home has ample space, is quite comfortable for her and is tastefully decorated. Her "guest" bedroom she calls her "heritage room" because it incudes family pieces such as an iron bed, several pieces of furniture, a quilt, and one of Jack's special pillows stitched from a crazy quilt comforter his grandmother had made. A picture of beautiful little four year old Ruth hangs on the wall in the hall. She showed me many other family photos which trigger pleasant memories.

I shall attempt to relate some of the things I learned during my visit with Ruth. Ruth Weber Yoder was born May 20, 1926 to Newton and Nellie Burkholder Weber in Brentwood, MD. The family moved to Ontario, Canada in 1929 and she started school in Waterloo, Ontario. At age 22, her father had been previously ordained by lot at Erb Street Mennonite Church in Waterloo, Ontario.

Ruth remembers during the depression their family had no car. In the winter they would ride a sleigh to church. Her father was also a delivery man for a bakery.

He would walk to work where he would hitch a horse and wagon to deliver bread. She remembers watching out the window eagerly waiting to see him coming over the hill home from work.

In 1934, the family which also included two sisters and a brother, Naomi, Rhoda and John, moved to Ft. Wayne, IN mission. Her mother often fed 'tramps.' Churches from Goshen would send food and they hosted many visitors. It was an early form of bed and breakfast!

Ruth then attended Eastern Mennonite High School (EMHS). She helped pay the cost by working in the dining room and ironing shirts in the laundry, earning eight cents per hour the first year. The next year, her pay increased to ten cents per hour!

After graduating high school, she worked in Washington, DC as a nanny in the home of a Navy Admiral. Her sister Naomi was the cook in the same household. The family moved to West Liberty in July of 1946 (so they could have a piano.) Her parents opened a small store on West Baird where her father had a painting and wallpaper business and her mother had a small gift shop. Later her father became a pastor at Bethel for a time.

In 1948 she married Jack and they lived on the Allgyer homestead for 52 years. Becoming a farmer's wife was a big adjustment for her as she had no previous experience of farm life. She remembers collecting water from the roof for the bathroom on the farm in the early years! They were blessed with three sons, Ed, Keith and Karl, seven grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

In addition to being a farmer's wife, she had worked for Dr. Polsley, volunteered over 3000 hours at Urbana Hospital and for 13 years, volunteered for two Urbana doctors every Friday.

A most significant event in her life was when Jack lost his arm in a farm accident. Jack accepted this tragedy with courage and a strong faith, but it changed things considerably for both of them. However, Jack continued to farm for 10 years after the accident. In 2000 they moved from the farm to West Liberty. After her beloved Jack

passed away in 2013, she made the move to Green Hills in 2014.

Ruth talked about significant changes in the world. Concerns are current events with all the terrorism, etc., also the changes seen in the churches and the fact that even in our small community there are currently four churches without pastors. She has not taken up with computers and other technology as she sees no need at her age.

She has also been a faithful member at Bethel for nearing 70 years,

has held many positions and has contributed in many ways, still participating in Mennonite Women with her beautiful quilting stitches. Ruth expressed appreciation for the Bethel church family as being an important part of their lives and for all the support Jack and she received these past 70 years.

She celebrated her 90th birthday with her family in May. Congratulations, Ruth on reaching such a wonderful milestone! May God continue to bless, guide and keep you in the coming years.

to those who were starting this new church in the Northridge area.

Five years later - 1996 - 20 years ago, Daniel Showalter and Betsy Lapp were the High School graduates.

In April our Bethel family enjoyed a morning of sharing in the lives of members 80 years and older. Thank you to those who planned that event!

That weekend, her family came from Toronto, Dallas, Atlanta and an OTR Semi to be together to celebrate with her. The group included 3 sons, 2 daughter-in-laws, 9 grandchildren, and 5 great grandchildren. We shared 2 meals in Ruth's apartment with everyone helping and having a good time!

On Saturday, Ruth's sons sponsored a noon meal at Der Dutchman in Plain City. This included some nieces and nephews and a few special friends. Soon it was time for everyone to go home, but many good memories remain. Thank you for your lovely cards with personal comments that mean a lot to me. I have been a member of Bethel Church for 70 years!
