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
The 3rd Annual Windmill Awards

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

What If I Pastored the Way that I Garden?

One of the things that I enjoy about spring and summer is the chance to work in the garden. In fact, I enjoy it so much that we have two plots. One is in our back yard with raised beds and the other is at the Adriel community garden.

To be honest, I enjoy gardening just for the sake of gardening, but it also provides fresh produce and can serve as a family activity. At other times, gardening provides space to reflect and pray while doing something with my hands. One might say that gardening is therapeutic for me. In fact, a recent Facebook meme sums it up well saying, “Gardening is cheaper than therapy, and you get tomatoes.”

Well recently I have been thinking about the number of images in the Bible that are based on gardening and agriculture. There are, for instance, the parable of the sower and the imagery of the vine and the branches to name a couple. These are models for ministry and I wonder “What would it be like if I pastored the way that I garden?”

For instance, I am not the most orthodox gardener. It’s a hobby and I figure I have nothing to lose so I get creative. In fact, I often tell people that gardening is just one great big experiment. I read and listen to what others say. I see pictures of creative gardening and then I take these ideas, adapt them and make them my own; learning through trial and error. If it doesn’t work this year, I may try again next year with a few alterations.

Doing this has led me to plant giant sunflowers alongside my tomatoes to provide 8-10 foot living tomato “stakes.” It has also led me to doing potato towers which are about 2 foot in diameter and allow me to add more soil as the plants grow. And this year, with my abundance of volunteer tomatoes, I am experimenting with growing tomatoes upside down, out of the bottom of hanging “baskets.” We’ll see if it works.

What would this mean for ministry? While I don’t want to diminish ministry to a “hobby,” I find myself wondering what it would be like to have that same holy abandon about the work that I do on God’s behalf. Not that I shouldn’t take it seriously, but that I not take it so seriously that I squelch the sense of playful abandon that can come with partnering with the Lord in “growing fruit” for the kingdom and doing it in creative ways. Perhaps this would allow me to adapt more readily to the changing context

around us.

Another consideration comes in part from a joke in which someone comes up to a gardener and says, “You and God have a beautiful garden.” To which the gardener replies, “Yeah, you should have seen it when God had it by Himself.” The first person is naming God’s part in the gardening process; and with a little humor, the gardener is reasserting his part in the process. This is true of ministry as well, isn’t it? We can’t bring about transformation in the lives of people and our community on our own, and yet God is committed to working with, in and through us in this endeavor, to be co-laborers with us.

Well one of my tendencies in gardening that frustrates some is to allow plants that I didn’t sow to grow. A gardener must have a discerning eye about which plants are for harvest and which are weeds, but sometimes the lines blur. Sometimes plants that can produce fruit pop up unexpectedly, in unplanned spaces as weeds that can choke out what we intended to grow there.

When a volunteer plant comes up, I must determine

whether to let it go, transplant it, or discard it. I often let these plants go for a time to see what they are and in the process have had a bumper crop of rat tail radishes this year that I did not plant. On the other hand, while I have transplanted some of the volunteer tomatoes that have popped up, I have also had to pull more than 800 of them because if I didn’t, they would choke out my beans.

I look at this approach to gardening as being a co-labor with God in an atypical way. It is not simply me planting, God growing, and me weeding. It is incorporating what God has planted, a “volunteer” plant, into my set and structured plan for the garden. It is being discerning about what should stay and what should go and adapting along the way for growth of the spirit that springs up unexpectedly.

In ministry, we have a tendency to plan everything out. And we have a tendency to squelch or pluck that which is not a part of our plan. But I wonder if as co-laborers with God, if we could be more discerning and flexible about the “volunteer plants” that sprout up. And if in doing so, God may supply a harvest that we didn’t expect and that is beyond what we would imagine possible. What would it be like if I pastored more like I garden?

Joining in with God's Movement by Pastor Rick Stoner

When I was a student at AMBS (then, Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary) one of my favorite professors was Alan Kreider. His passion for God's mission in the world was infectious as he sought to hold together peace and missions, which can so often be ripped apart.

One of the prayers that he would often use, and encourage us to use, was, "Lord, we know that you are moving in the world around us. Help us to see your movement and have the courage to join in." The prayer reminds us that God is a living God, and that God is already at work in our community; in the lives of those who we encounter on a daily basis. And, the prayer reminds us that we need to work on our vision!

In our year of discernment prayer, we pray, "We want to join in what you [God] are already doing in the world." This is a powerful statement. To pray this and really mean it we must let go of our agendas, which can be risky because we are no longer "in control." Yet, this cannot happen if we cannot see God's movement.

The Jews of Jesus' day had a vision problem too. Although Jesus was right before them many struggled to see, truly see, him. Jesus often quoted from the prophet Isaiah saying, "You will be ever hearing but never understanding; you will be ever seeing but never perceiving. For this people's heart has become calloused; they hardly hear with their ears, and they have closed their eyes." It would seem that there was something blocking their vision, and maybe the same blockage is plaguing us too. You see, whenever something becomes too familiar we don't see it fully. We grow accustomed to it as it fades into the background of our minds. Maybe God's story had become too familiar for the people around Jesus. Maybe they were so stuck in the rut of the law that they had closed their eyes. Now if we fast forward in time to us, maybe we have done the same thing with our faith. Maybe our worship has become too routine and we are sleepwalking through our times of worship thus missing God's movement. Additionally, maybe we have become so accustomed to the community we live in and the people here, that we think we know what's going on; but we are still missing the movement.

Recently I had the youth go out into the neighborhood and take pictures that represent new life (Alex Steiner took this picture of an old car, saying it can become like new when restored.) This exercise was meant to help the youth begin to see the world around them with fresh eyes. We need to do this on a daily basis. If we are able to daily submit our vision to the Lord, then perhaps we can begin to enter into God's movement because we can see it.

So then, through this daily submission to God's will, we too can begin to see the world around us through new eyes. This is crucial because if we are to truly join in God's movement, we must first see it! We must allow the scales and crust that form over our eyes after years of comfort, to be peeled off. The familiar must become unfamiliar again, until we see the movement of Jesus in the life of our worship and fellowship, as well as in the relationships with those around us.

For if we dare to allow ourselves to be swept up in the movement of the Spirit, then maybe we might be transformed from those who are "ever seeing but never perceiving," into those who see the righteousness of God as it springs forth in unexpected places.

He is choosing to be baptized because he is ready to make his commitment official. His favorite things about Bethel are the people and the awesome Christmas Eve services.




Mission Presentation by Dennis & Connie Byler

Connie is an elder on the leadership team at their local Mennonite church, Comunidades Unidas Anabautistas, and provides spiritual companionship and counseling to many people, including those not accepted by society.

Missing Prayer Chain Messages

The problem is, as soon as a phone is answered, One Call Now's recorded message begins, while the recipient's outgoing message is still playing, resulting in the message being cropped.

Bethel's History Notes

Let's go way back in time this month. One of the early young people's meetings which were held was called the Literary Society. These were mid-week meetings with the young people of the 3 churches, Oak Grove, Bethel and South Union back in the 1930's, early '40's, that included singing and Biblical studies.

One of the highlights for these groups in the fall was "The Box Social." The girls would pack two lunches, and the fellows would bid on the box, then there would be friendship in sharing the meal.

Another highlight was "The First Saturday of June Outing." This was for couples only (discrimination??) And again, the girls

packed the lunch. Remember, this was before there were any McDonalds or other deli or burger shops. One of the favorite places for the outing was Indian Lake, where they were able to rent boats for rowing. Some of the group sometimes would even go to the skating rink (which may have been frowned upon by some of the parents.) --Thanks to Miriam Headings for this information about these young people activities.

In the 1950's, the next young people's group was formed and called MYF (Mennonite Youth Fellowship,) also with the 3 churches. And, speaking of MYF, it was 35 years ago, Green Hills was just opening and the local MYF spent a Saturday there, picking up rocks and stones so the lawns would be smooth and mow-able.

They have faithfully attended VBS since they were little boys. "Thank you" to these three boys for your service the past two years of coming every morning to VBS and your willingness to jump in and help wherever you were needed. Our three High School girls, Becky Wilkins, Annie Steiner, and Savannah Hostetler have once again been faithful in using their individual talents in assisting the committee members - thank you girls!

Our mission project this year was contributing to MCC project of assisting with education of Syrian refugee children. The offering amount was \$1232.56. Hopefully through concentrating on this project adults and children alike will be more aware of the plight of the refugees of Syria.

Thanks to all who prayed, donated snack items, prepared and taught, and brought children to the church each morning.

As we think of this VBS season where we came together again as family and friends old and new, let us be aware of our faithfulness and our obedience in answering God's call. "We leave the responsibility of the growth of the seeds planted to You, Lord. Amen"

Peace & Justice Focus on Syria & Immigration by Bill Shumaker

The Peace and Justice group has been concentrating on the issues of Syria and immigration, our two priorities at the present time. Homelessness, Human Trafficking, Everyone a Peacemaker, Palestine, Veterans and Bullying are on hold for now.

Response in giving for the Syrian crisis has been exceptionally good. Through designated offerings and the Bible school project approximately \$1300 has been raised. This will be sent to MCC and they will put it to use as they see fit. That is very good because the crisis there is not going away. In fact it is getting worse by the day. The present violence in Iraq is complicating the problem. In addition to the money for Syria, \$1205 has been donated for the crisis in south Sudan.

The immigration keeps growing due to violence in Central America. Many young people (13 years old and up) are fleeing because their life is being threatened. Chuck has re-

cently been in contact with an acquaintance in Brooks County Texas, right in the heart of where immigrants are crossing the Rio Grande river, and Eleanor has a grand niece teaching in the valley. Intentions are to make further contact with them, and ask what kind of support is needed.

As time goes on, we want to keep you informed about other Peace and Justice issues for the furtherance of your prayer life. And who knows, perhaps there is a specific issue close to the heart of an unknown supporter.

In the meantime, I must say that I am impressed with the generosity of Bethelites!!

Pray that in the words of Isaiah, "He will judge between the nations and will settle disputes for many peoples. They will beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore."

me. Matthew 5:7

6) **INTEGRITY** this morning I will guard my heart, placing the integrity of my motives before your eyes, because you alone know my true heart. Matthew 5:8 *and you alone can purify my heart as I behold you.*

7) **WISDOM** this morning I will carefully choose my words so I do not disturb the peace, because you have called me to peace and
